
Women's Political Participation in Local Governance in India: A Critical Study of the Impact of Constitutional Reservation on Grassroots Democracy

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Abstract

Women's political participation is essential for democratic inclusiveness and gender justice. In India, the 73rd and 74th Constitutional Amendments (1992–93) marked a historic milestone by institutionalizing decentralized governance and mandating not less than one-third reservation for women in Panchayati Raj Institutions (PRIs) and Urban Local Bodies (ULBs). Several states later increased this reservation to 50%, making India home to the largest number of elected women representatives in the world. This research paper critically examines the constitutional framework, extent of participation, socio-economic determinants, challenges, and governance outcomes associated with women's political participation at the grassroots level. The study argues that while reservation has ensured descriptive representation, substantive empowerment depends on education, economic independence, institutional support, and transformation of patriarchal social structures. The paper concludes that constitutional reservation has significantly deepened grassroots democracy but requires complementary reforms for sustained gender empowerment.

Introduction

Democracy is meaningful only when all sections of society actively participate in governance. Political participation refers to the involvement of citizens in political processes such as voting, contesting elections, policy formulation, and decision-making. Although the Indian Constitution guarantees equality under Articles 14, 15, and 16, women remained underrepresented in political institutions after independence. While women actively participated in the freedom movement, their representation in Parliament and State Assemblies remained below 10% for decades.

The adoption of the 73rd and 74th Constitutional Amendments in 1992–93 marked a revolutionary change. These amendments:

Granted constitutional status to local self-government institutions

- Mandated one-third reservation for women
- Ensured regular elections
- Strengthened democratic decentralization

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Today, women constitute approximately 46–48% of elected representatives in Panchayati Raj Institutions (Ministry of Panchayati Raj, 2023). This paper examines whether this quantitative increase has translated into qualitative empowerment and democratic deepening.

Theoretical Framework:

Feminist Political Theory

Feminist scholars argue that political systems historically reflect patriarchal power structures. Anne Phillips (1995) emphasized the “politics of presence,” arguing that fair representation requires physical inclusion of marginalized groups.

Participatory Democracy

Carole Pateman (1970) argued that democracy must extend beyond voting and include active citizen participation in decision-making. Decentralization enhances participatory democracy by bringing governance closer to people.

Concept of Representation

Hanna Pitkin (1967) categorized representation into:

- **Descriptive Representation**—Numerical presence
- **Substantive Representation**—Advocacy of group interests
- **Symbolic Representation**—Changing societal perceptions

India’s local governance reforms primarily enhanced descriptive representation, with gradual progress toward substantive empowerment.

Constitutional and Institutional Framework

73rd Constitutional Amendment Act, 1992

- Added Part IX to the Constitution
- Established three-tier Panchayati Raj system:
 - Gram Panchayat
 - Panchayats Miti
 - Zila Parishad

Mandated:

33% reservation for women (including SC/ST women)

Reservation in Chairperson positions

Regular elections every five years

74th Constitutional Amendment Act, 1992

- Added Part IX-A
- Provided constitutional status to Urban Local Bodies
- Mandated one-third reservation for women
- Several states (Bihar, Rajasthan, Madhya Pradesh, Kerala, etc.) increased reservation to **50%**.

Extent of Women's Representation

India currently has:

- Over 2.6 lakh Gram Panchayats
- Nearly 3 million elected representatives

Around 1.4–1.5 million women representatives Women constituency early 46–48% of total PRI representatives.

In contrast:

- Lok Sabha representation of women (before recent reforms) :around14%
- State Assemblies: approximately 8–12%

Thus, grass roots governance shows far greater gender inclusion than higher legislative bodies

Proxy Representation (Sarpanch Pati System)

In many areas, male relatives exercise de facto power on behalf of women.
